General anesthesia: Under general anesthesia, your child will be completely asleep and pain free. Specially-trained anesthesia professionals (physicians, dentists, or certified nurse anesthetists) will administer medications and monitor your child while a separate dentist or oral surgeon performs the dental procedure or surgery.

Anesthesia for infants and children is most frequently initiated with an inhalation induction of sevoflurane vapor, because most infants and children do not have an IV line prior to induction. The primary intravenous hypnotic drug for children is propofol.

A: In young children, the safest way to perform most surgeries is under general anesthesia. The medications used for sedation have the same side effects as general anesthetics and vary depending on a child's age, weight, developmental level, health history, physical exam, and the type of test being performed.

Anesthesia and Your Child For most parents, the thought of their child undergoing general anesthesia is by far the most frightening part of any planned surgery. This is understandable, since anesthesia is unfamiliar to most families.

Your child's dentist will recommend general anesthesia to perform dental treatments only if it is needed. Your child will sleep through the procedure and have no memory of it. When anesthesia is needed, there are special rules for eating and drinking at home before the procedure. Your child will have some restrictions after the procedure.

Anesthesia and your Child

There are risks associated with anesthesia for every person—young and old—so it's understandable that you may be wary of putting your child under. Recent studies have also raised concerns that children under 3 years of age who are exposed to anesthesia may have an increased risk of developing learning disabilities.

The most common type of anesthesia for children having a surgery is general anesthesia. General anesthesia is a special kind of medications that cause sleep. When asleep, your child will experience no alertness or pain. General anesthesia can be given as a gas that your child breathes or as medications given through an intravenous ("IV") line.

The initial research that sparked the concern about anesthesia and children was related to fetal alcohol syndrome. Ethanol (alcoholic beverages) given to pregnant rodents and young rodents was shown to affect the NMDA and GABA receptors in the brain. Both of these receptors are known sites of action for sedative and anesthetic drugs.

Physician anesthesiologists understand that children often are frightened about medical procedures and surgery, and they will work with you, your child and the other physicians and nurses before, during and after the procedure to calm fears and ensure your child's safety and comfort.

Preparing for Surgery: Kids Checklist

General anesthesia makes your child's whole body go to sleep and is needed for certain tests and surgeries so that his or her reflexes will be completely relaxed. General anesthesia makes certain surgeries and tests easier and safer to do because your child will not feel any pain during the procedure or have any memory of it.

General anesthesia helps ensure your child will remain still for a successful exam. Sometimes, children with certain conditions cannot be given sedatives safely and require general anesthesia. Often this can only be determined after the child is evaluated in person by the anesthesiologist.

Local anesthesia forms the backbone of pain control techniques in dentistry and has a major role in dentistry for children. There is a constant search for ways to avoid the invasive and often painful nature of the injection, and to find a more comfortable and pleasant means of achieving local anesthesia before dental procedures.

Children with neuromuscular disease commonly present for anaesthesia as part of the diagnostic process (e.g. MRI, muscle biopsy), for surgery relating to their underlying disorder (e.g. gastrostomy, corrective orthopaedic surgery, strabismus surgery), or for incidental surgery.

Anaesthesia For Children

If general anesthesia is used, the anesthesiologist will start transitioning your child from the normal awake state to the sleepy state of anesthesia. This is referred to as induction, which is usually done by either injecting medicine through an IV or by inhaling gases through a mask.

Often, general dental anaesthesia is used in cases when a child has numerous teeth with decay, says Diya Chadha, a paediatric dentist at Smile Town Dentistry in Burnaby, BC, who adds that it isn't unusual to see eight to 10 teeth with cavities.

In very rare cases, anesthesia can cause complications in children (such as strange heart rhythms, breathing problems, allergic reactions to medications, and even death). The risks depend on the kind of procedure, the condition of the patient, and the type of anesthesia used.

Anesthesia May Harm Children's Brains

Intravenous sedation is delivered through a needle inserted into the patient's vein. The American Society of Dentist Anesthesiologists explains that nitrous oxide is used to send the child to sleep before a needle is inserted, usually into a vein on the back of the child's hand. A tube is also inserted into the patient's throat to aid breathing.
