There are two main types of word chunks, clauses and phrases. A clause is a bunch of words with a conjugated verb in it. A phrase is a bunch of words without a conjugated verb in it. In the section on nouns, you learned a key concept about chunks of words that act as nouns.

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Definitions. A clause is a group of words containing a subject and verb. An independent clause is a simple sentence. It can stand on its own. Examples: She is hungry. I am feeling well today. A dependent clause cannot stand on its own. It needs an independent clause to complete a sentence.

Adjectives - Phrases and Clauses

a clause in a complex sentence that cannot stand alone as a complete sentence and that functions within the sentence as a noun or adjective or adverb Sentence Fragments Phrases or incomplete sentences missing either a subject, predicate, or a complete thought.

Unlike phrases, a clause can sometimes act as a sentence - this type of clause is called an independent clause. This isn't always the case, and some clauses can't be used on their own - these are called subordinate clauses, and need to be used with an independent clause to complete their meaning.

A phrase is a group of words that makes some sense but not complete sense. A phrase does not have a subject or verb. A clause is a group of words that makes complete sense. A clause must have a subject and a verb.

Clause, Phrase, Sentence – Learn the Difference

A phrase is described as a group of two or more than two words related to one another, that constitute a single unit. On the other extreme, the clause is a part of a sentence, that contains a subject (noun phrase) that actively performs an action (finite verb form). A phrase is a part of a clause or a sentence.
