Latest OECD figures on health spending show that health spending grew by less than 2% in 2017 with provisional estimates pointing to around 2.5% growth in 2018. OECD spending on health as a share of GDP remained at around 8.8% on average in 2017, according to OECD Health Statistics 2019,

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released on July 2.

The National Health Expenditure Accounts (NHEA) are the official estimates of total health care spending in the United States. Dating back to 1960, the NHEA measures annual U.S. expenditures for health care goods and services, public health activities, government administration, the net cost of health insurance, and investment related to health care.

Trends in health care spending Health spending in the U.S. increased by 4.6% in 2018 to \$3.6 trillion or \$11,172 per capita. This growth rate is slightly faster than what was observed in 2017 (4.2 percent) and the same as 2016 (4.6 percent).

Spending on health care has, of course, been rising in the U.S. for decades. Health care now accounts for 18 cents of every dollar Americans spend, up from 7 cents in 1970.

Health spending measures the final consumption of health care goods and services (i.e. current health expenditure) including personal health care (curative care, rehabilitative care, long-term care, ancillary services and medical goods) and collective services (prevention and public health services as well as health administration), but excluding spending on investments.

A study of international health care spending levels published in the health policy journal Health Affairs in the year 2000 found

National health care spending in the United States is expected to grow at an average annual rate of 5.4% from 2019 to 2028, outpacing the gross domestic product's average annual growth rate of 4.3%, according to preliminary projections from CMS' Office of the Actuary published last week in Health Affairs.
