FED OSHA does not have a specific standard that covers working in hot environments. Nonetheless, under the OSH Act, employers have a duty to protect workers from recognized serious hazards in the workplace, including heat-related hazards.

The OSH Act of 1970 requires the Secretary of Labor to produce regulations that require employers to keep records of occupational deaths, injuries, and ill- nesses. The records are used for several purposes. Injury and illness statistics are used by OSHA.

Safety Records: Recording Work-Related Illness and Injury Each employer is required by OSHA to keep records of fatalities, injuries, and illnesses. Specifically, they must record each fatality, injury and illness that is work-related is a new case, and meets one or more of the general recording criteria noted in Section 1904.7 (or the application to...

Recordkeeping Policies and Procedures Manual ...
Review records of work-related injuries and illnesses. File a complaint asking OSHA to inspect their workplace if they believe there is a serious hazard or that their employer is not following OSHA's rules. OSHA will keep all identities confidential. Exercise their rights under the law without retaliation, including reporting an injury or raising health and safety concerns with their employer or OSHA.

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OSHA Recordkeeping Handbook
OSHA published a Final Rule to amend its recordkeeping regulation to remove the requirement to electronically submit to OSHA information from the OSHA Form 300 (Log of Work-Related Injuries and Illnesses) and OSHA Form 301 (Injury and Illness Incident Report) for establishments with 250 or more employees that are required to routinely keep injury and illness records.

Worker Illness and Injury Reports. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) publishes annual statistics for occupational injuries (including hearing loss) reported by employers as part of required recordkeeping. The BLS data show that hearing loss represented 12% of the occupational illnesses reported in 2010 (Figure 9). This represents more than 18,000 workers who experienced significant loss of hearing due to workplace noise exposure.
