According to the International Society for the Study of Hypertension in Pregnancy (ISSHP), a research definition of pre-eclampsia is newly diagnosed hypertension after 20 weeks of pregnancy with well documented proteinuria (32). Many of the women included in the studies had hypertension or proteinuria before pregnancy (2,8,12,19,22,24,26,27).
