The History of the First Amendment

To become part of the Constitution, an amendment must be ratified by either (as determined by Congress): The legislatures of three-fourths of the states; or by. State ratifying conventions in three-fourths of the states. The only amendment to be ratified through the state convention method thus far is the Twenty-first Amendment in 1933.

First Amendment legal definition of First Amendment

The Establishment Clause of the First Amendment, principally authored by James Madison, reflects this consensus. The language of the Establishment Clause itself applies only to the federal government (“Congress shall pass no law respecting an establishment of religion”).
